Common council urges agency to deem Copake solar application incomplete

The Common Council unanimously approved a resolution at its meeting last week urging the state Office of Renewable Energy Siting and Electric Transmission to deem the application for the construction of the Shepherd's Run Solar Farm in Copake incomplete until the company Hecate can show it will not impact the Taghkanic Creek Watershed.

The Taghkanic Creek Watershed is a roughly 50-square-mile area of woods, fields, farms and wetlands that includes the Taghkanic Creek, according to the Columbia Land Conservancy's 2022 Taghkanic Headwaters Conservation Plan report.

The Taghkanic Creek provides drinking water to the city of Hudson, as well as the towns of Taghkanic, Hillsdale, Claverack and Copake.

A similar resolution was passed by the Common Council, but it was updated due to the specifications of the project changing, Thomas DePietro, president of the Common Council, said Wednesday.

"It's a smaller array now, but it would still affect the creek that feeds the Hudson," he said.

The initial plans for the Shepherd's Run project were a 60-megawatt solar energy farm, including panels that convert sunlight directly into electricity, inverters, security fencing, access roads, a substation, and an interconnection point with the Craryville 115-kilowatt substation owned by New York State Electric and Gas.

The new proposal for the project includes a smaller footprint of 215 acres, and the electricity output dropped from 60 megawatts to 42 megawatts.

The smaller footprint of the project

is due to Hecate losing access to a parcel of land that would have included about 20% of the project's initial 265-acre footprint. The land parcel would have included the access road on the main piece of land leading to the solar panels.

Hecate was leasing land at the corner of Cambridge Road and county Route 7 with the expectation of purchasing or continuing the lease on the property, but the lease ran out in September 2023.

About four months later, on Jan. 2, Craryville Farms LLC, which is not affiliated with Hecate, purchased the 60 acres Hecate previously leased. The LLC denied leasing the land back to Hecate for its inclusion in the project.

After the land sale, Hecate's initial application to the state Office of Renewable Energy Siting was rejected.

Copake Town Supervisor Richard Wolf welcomed the resolution.

"It's good to see that Hudson officials are taking the potential threat to their water supply very seriously," he said. "It's incumbent on Hecate to address concerns about possible impacts on Hudson's water supply."

Hecate filed a notice of intent to file its application with the state Office of Renewable Energy Siting in March, with the intended application date set as on or around June 3, according to the agency's website. The company has not submitted its new application.

The company has commissioned multiple reviews to assess every as-

pect of the solar farm's impact on the Taghkanic Creek Watershed, Matt Levine, project manager for the Shepherd's Run Solar Project, said in a statement.

"Collectively they show that the project will greatly improve water quality - especially compared to current land use - and will have no impact on downstream flooding," he said. "All those studies were submitted along with the permit application and are publicly available. While we share the concerns of Council members and would have appreciated the opportunity to discuss this matter with them before they voted, we look forward to working with local leaders to address their concerns so we can continue the vital effort of helping New York State meet its ambitious clean energy goals."

According to the company's watershed review from June 2024, the entire Taghkanic Creek Watershed is 30,773 acres, 22,537 of which are forested.

The total project area within the watershed is 723 acres, 246 which are forested, and Hecate is clearing 29 acres of forested land for the project, according to the watershed review.

According to the watershed review, Hecate will convert some of the project lead to a vegetative cover from land that is used for feed corn, which will minimize soil erosion and protect the wetlands in the watershed, as well as streams.

"The project has also been sited to avoid wetlands, wetland adjacent areas, streams, and streambanks, and to avoid fragmentation between forest patches to the maximum extent practicable and protecting the natural environment at all our project sites," according to Hecate's watershed review.

Developer presents revised Bliss Towers plans

Representatives from the Hudson Housing Authority's development partner, Mountco Construction, presented revised plans for the redevelopment of Bliss Towers at the housing authority's meeting Monday night.

The project will still be built in two phases, with phase one consisting of the construction of sites consisting of sites A1 and B. Site B is located on State Street, and Site A1 is located on an empty parcel of land west of Columbia Apartments.

Site C, which will be completed as part of phase two of the project, is the current location of Bliss Towers.

Site B would consist of one five-story building, and another four-story building, for a total of 110 units of affordable housing, while site A1 would also be five stories, with 50 units.

New offices for the Hudson Hous-

ing Authority would also be located on the ground floor of site A1, and each of the buildings constructed will contain a community room, laundry room and computer room.

A gym or recreation room will also be included in the buildings on site A1 and B, Eu Ting-Zambuto, director of development for Mountco Construction, said during the housing authority's meeting Monday.

Mountco and the Hudson Housing Authority is also proposing a 2,800-square-foot commercial area be included in the ground floor of one of the buildings on site B, Ting-Zambuto said.

"We're looking for a nice nonprofit food market to potentially take some space there, and that's been generally well received, but we're going to come back to the community with more details as they become available," she said.

Siena Poll: most New Yorkers support Prop 1, known as Equal Rights Amendment

Proposition 1, a proposal on the ballot in New York this year also known as the Equal Rights Amendment, maintains majority support from voters despite conservative pushback over the airwaves, according to a poll from the Siena College Research Institute.

The ballot proposal — which supporters say codifies anti-discrimination protections into the state Constitution and opponents say opens the door to transgender athletes in girls sports — is polling at 69% support. That's up 5% since last week.

Approximately 872 respondents were surveyed in the SCRI poll from Oct. 13 to Oct. 17.

"Regionally, it's supported by 57% of upstate voters, 69% of downstate suburban voters and 84% of New York City voters," said SCRI poll-

ster Steven Greenberg. "More than three-quarters of women support the amendment, as do 58% of men."

Along ideological lines, the support is 96% from liberals, 72% from moderates and 36% from conservatives. Racial lines are just as stark: 93% of Black people/African Americans plan to vote yes on the ERA, while 65% of white respondents said they would do the same.

Meanwhile, slightly more voters either know about the ERA or have an opinion regarding it. Eight percent said they didn't about it or refused to respond in the most recent poll, which is a 5% change from the 13% of respondents last month.

It maintains 22% disapproval overall. That's down 1% since October.

On the same day the poll and a new advertisement from the Vote No On Prop One Committee were

released, U.S. Rep. Elise Stefanik, R-Saratoga, put out a news release urging voters to shoot down the proposition.

"Common sense New Yorkers across party lines have read the language of the amendment and refuse to be duped by deceptive gaslighting maneuvers by failed Democrats to desperately drive voters to the ballot box," said the high-ranking House Republican.

Despite competing in a federal race, Stefanik's opponent has taken the opposite approach. At a town hall meeting in Johnstown last week, Democratic challenger Paula Collins rallied behind the ERA. She even includes a blurb on her website in support of the measure under her "ISSUES" section.

The ERA has run the gauntlet since it passed through the state

Legislature in 2023. The ballot proposal's language was questioned in a lawsuit out of concern that it wasn't displayed in plain English. Democrats advocated for the question on the ballot to include the words "LGBT" and "abortion" to no avail.

Republicans have pushed to get it off the ballot altogether. State Supreme Court Justice Daniel J. Doyle, responding to a GOP lawsuit in May, ruled that legislators failed to properly approve the amendment and knocked it off the ballot. However, that ruling was eventually overturned by the state Court of Appeals.

phase of the project is completed, residents of Bliss Towers will have the opportunity to move into the new buildings, Ting-Zambuto said.

"You'll move into the new buildings with your same rent structure," she said. "Nothing will change in terms of you having a voucher in the new project."

The new housing could also provide additional affordable housing for the community in Hudson, Ting-Zambuto said.

"We are also looking to introduce affordable housing for school teachers, civil service members, hospital workers," she said. "Different populations that all need affordable housing in the city."

Completion of the first phase of the project will also allow for the demolition of Bliss Towers after the current residents move to the new buildings. The first phase of the project is estimated to take two or more years, Ting-Zambuto said.

"Those will run on the same construction timeline, and that will be enough time to completely vacate Bliss Towers and Columbia Apartments," she said.

The total cost of the project is estimated to be around \$220 million. In August, the financing partners within the state requested Mountco look into measures to lower the project's cost.

Some of the cost-lowering options presented to the Hudson Housing Authority included changing the project's building materials from steel and concrete to wood frame, and reducing the height of some of the buildings.

"Costs are still floating, we were able to reduce the overall costs on building materials," Ting-Zambuto said Tuesday.

No financing for the project has been committed yet, Ting-Zambuto said during the meeting Monday.

"We've been discussing the financing with multiple parties, nothing has been committed yet," she said. "One of the reasons we looked into reducing the height was it was a very effective way to address cost savings with the materials and labor costs used from one material to the next."

The company is also planning for environmental remediation of the site, but the scope of the work is not set yet, Ting-Zambuto said Tuesday.

"Right now we are thinking in our heads it's going to be carving soil out and replacing it, but that's not a determined course of action," she said.

Environmental remediation is a normal thing for projects that involve funding from the state, Ting-Zambuto said.

"Every state project will entail an environmental review so they can attach themselves to a clean site," she said. "It's going to make the land better."

A proposed pedestrian walkway that would take up part of State Street is also still being considered as part of the redevelopment plans, but would occur after construction is completed, Ting-Zambuto said.

"It's something that could happen now, or 10 years from now, but it's not vital to the project," she said. "It shouldn't happen until after demolition of Bliss Towers and Columbia Apartments."

If the proposed pedestrianization of State Street does not happen the overall redevelopment project would not be impacted, Ting-Zambuto said.

"We'd like it to happen, it would make a huge difference, but it's not going to paralyze the project," she said. "It's a hit to the master plan, but it's not going to paralyze the project."

HHA seeks potential property purchase extension

The Hudson Housing Authority is requesting an extension from the Hudson Community Development and Planning Agency on their yearly payment for priority consideration for purchasing property owned by the agency.

The Hudson Housing Authority voted unanimously at its meeting Monday night to request an extension from the Hudson Community Development and Planning Agency on their \$25,000 payment due Oct. 31.

The Hudson Housing Authority entered an agreement with the Hudson Community Development and Planning Agency three years ago, in 2021, to be given the opportunity to purchase property in the city.

The housing authority pays the agency \$25,000 every October to be given priority over other developers for purchasing property owned by the Hudson Community Development and Planning Agency.

This is the third year of the agreement between the housing authority and agency, and the housing authority is seeking an extension until the end of the year while it plans the redevelopment of Bliss Towers and Columbia Apartments.

"This year, as we're getting closer to development, we're trying to figure out what our plans are," Jeffrey Dodson, executive director of the Hudson Housing Authority, said Tuesday. We're not sure which properties we're going to purchase, if at all, so we asked for an extension until the end of the year."

Properties on the list that the HHA could acquire is roughly 20 items long, and includes property on State Street and Lombard Street, as well as Front Street and Warren Street that was included in the housing authority's initial redevelopment plans as townhouses.

"Considering the cost of what we have to do with our development, we have to make sure that all fits," Dodson said. "This is the final year of the agreement, and we want to be certain of our decision."

If the housing authority does not go through with purchasing the land parcels, the overall development plan for Bliss Towers will not be affected, Dodson said.

If the HCDPA declines the extension, the housing authority will have to pay their balance, or let go of the property, Dodson said.

"We'll have to make a decision to pay, or we'll just release the property," he said.

Hudson 1st Ward Councilmember and treasurer of the Hudson Community Development and Planning

Agency Margaret Morris questioned the Housing Authority's decision to try and seek an extension on their payment during its meeting Monday night.

"We can certainly grant you an extension to decide which properties you are or are not going to purchase, that's fine," she said. "But why would we grant you an extension? I do not understand why the housing authority should not go forward, pay what is due on October 31, in the normal scheme of things you were or were not planning to purchase."

Rebecca Wolf, a member of the Hudson Housing Authority's Board of Commissioners, said that Morris' comments at the meeting were inappropriate.

"This is not a time to discuss what the HCDPA [Hudson Community Development and Planning Agency] wants from the HHA [Hudson Housing Authority]," she said during the meeting Monday.

The housing authority could opt-out of paying the \$25,000 to the agency, Morris said.

"Should the housing authority decide that they are not going forward, and they are not going to pay the additional \$25,000 for the city of Hudson to hold those buildings off for the HHA [Hudson Housing Authority] to purchase them, that's fine," she said. "You can opt out as of Oct. 31, not pay the \$25,000, and let it pass, and then the city of Hudson can then pursue other options for selling those lots."

Morris is not the only person on the board of the Hudson Community Development and Planning Agency, Revonda Smith, chair of the Hudson Housing Authority's Board of Commissioners and vice chair of the Hudson Community Development and Planning Agency, said during the meeting Monday.

"The entire board is not here to make these comments or to agree to them or to be represented," she said.

Smith also said that Morris' comments were "disgusting" and that she was "making a mess of" herself.

The Hudson Community Development and Planning Agency decided to hold off on making a decision on the housing authority's agreement until they decided if they were going to pay on Oct. 31, Morris said.

"I am waiting to hear what the HHA [Hudson Housing Authority] is going to decide on that, so that we can move forward, and we may have a special meeting after this once HHA decides whether they are or not going to pay the \$25,000 that they owe to HCDPA [Hudson Community Development and Planning Agency] on Oct. 31," she said.

Women charged with animal cruelty in cat case

Two Hillsdale women have been arrested on multiple charges of animal cruelty after allegedly failing to care for

cats, according to State Police.

Jennifer Rossi, 45, and Peggy Card, 45, were arrested on Friday after State Police in Livingston received a tip on potential animal abuse.

Members of the State Police, as well as the Columbia-Greene Humane Society, Animal Nation Inc., and the town of Hillsdale Building Department determined Rossi and Card failed to care for 40 cats, State Police said in a press release.

Animal Nation volunteered to take the cats to their shelter in Westchester County, and two of the cats rescued were taken to a local vet for their poor condition, and later pronounced dead, police said.

Rossi and Card were each charged with 40 counts of torturing or injuring animals/failure to provide sustenance, a class A misdemeanor.

Rossi and Card are scheduled to appear in Hillsdale Town Court on Nov. 20.

Wednesday Wanderings: Going bump in the night

It's spooky season! It is that special time of year for all things dark and mysterious, all creatures weird and wonderful. Most of these animals are what we call nocturnal — they are active at night — or crepuscular — active during dawn and dusk hours.

Our "spooky" animals in Columbia County include owls, bats, coyotes, opossums, raccoons, and skunks. Some of these animals get a bad rap — if you've ever had to wash a dog that's been "skunked" or had a raccoon tear through your trash like an agent of chaos, you were probably pretty annoyed! Many of these animals, however, play essential roles in our ecosystems.

Bats, for instance, are excellent pollinators, particularly for night-blooming flowers. They can also consume their entire body weight in insects every night, acting as natural pest control.

Other spooky night creatures like the coyote and the skunk are also excellent pest control, particularly for small rodents that can damage your garden. These omnivores also do a bit of gardening themselves, spreading seeds and plants through their scat.

Raccoons may have earned the nickname "trash panda" by digging through suburban cans. Still, they're also playing an essential role in the eco-

system — they eat the remains of dead animals and small rodents and insects, keeping things neat. Opossums are another member of nature's clean-up crew, feeding on young mice and rats, slugs, ticks, and beetles — in addition to the remains of dead animals.

How can you show more care for these creatures? First of all — don't feed them! All these animals are excellent at sourcing their food, and giving them food will keep them from performing their important ecosystem duties! You can, however, create habitats that will provide good food sources. This can include planting night-blooming flowers and shrubs for bats or leaving trees and stumps to decay, which will

attract insects for opossums and raccoons.

Perhaps most importantly, be mindful about your use of outdoor lighting. Keeping the lights on when you don't need them can be confusing for our nighttime lurker friends and may impact their daily rhythms.

Council has right to seek special election

Maybe the Republican elections commissioner in Saratoga County should stick to running elections, and leave the governing of the city of Saratoga Springs to the elected officials there. GOP Elections Commissioner Joseph Suhrada certainly has a role to play, when and if the Saratoga Springs City Council decides to move forward with a special election to fill the vacancy left in August with the resignation of Public Works Commissioner Jason Golub.

But it is not his job to scold the members of the city's City Council for seeking the special election. He doesn't have the responsibility of governing a city without a duly elected commissioner responsible for running such a major city operation as public works. He has no business chastising city officials for scheduling the special election in the middle of January or so close to a presidential inauguration. He doesn't have the right to tell the council to appoint someone rather than invite the citizens to make the decision. It's not his job to interpret the city's charter for them. It's not his decision whether the council should spend its taxpayers' money to hold the special election.

And he certainly has no right to resort to the kind of disrespectful, petty name-calling that he used in describing the council's decision, deeming its approach to seeking a special election "childish outbursts," referring to the special election plan as a "Looney Tunes" idea and labeling the council as having a sense of "entitlement" or "exceptionalism" for wanting to put the vacancy before voters.

Why are special elections held in other communities considered legitimate exercises of democracy, but when Saratoga Springs officials want to do the same thing, it would be a "crazy election" akin to an "improvised clown show"?

If this is how the self-proclaimed "adult in the room acts," then we need to redefine adulthood. Mr. Suhrada's job isn't to decide the reasonableness of the council's decision. It's his job to take the request and make every effort to fulfill it, whether he agrees with it or not.

One of the problems with this whole issue is that no one seems to have a clear answer on whether the council is even allowed to schedule a special election and who, if anyone, has the authority to grant or deny the request.

Even the lawyer for the state Board of Elections urged city officials to reach out to the state attorney general's office. If that person doesn't know how the city should proceed, why does Mr. Suhrada believe he does? In fact, Mr. Suhrada said if the attorney general's office renders an opinion that differs from his, he'll consider amending his view. That's mighty adult of him.

If the City Council ultimately learns from the state or the courts that it indeed does not have the authority to hold a special election, then it should — and likely will — proceed with making an interim appointment to the vacant seat.

But the first goal should be to fill that seat with someone who carries the will of the voters. The council has decided unanimously that the best way to do that is by holding a special election.

That's hardly childish. That's democracy.

Stealth health

As Harris releases records, Trump's refusal leaves his health an open question

The following editorial appeared in the New York Daily News:

Last week, at an event billed as a town hall in Pennsylvania, Donald Trump spent about 40 minutes standing on stage, mostly wordlessly swaying to music that he'd selected, confusing the press and his fans in attendance.

The odd turn of events and the lack of any reasonable explanation from the campaign — along with a stream of other incidents including Trump losing his train of thought or struggling through certain words — has refocused attention on the simple question of whether the former president is really all there, mentally and health-wise.

Against that backdrop, Kamala Harris has released a medical history and health records, complete with vitals and specifics, which judged the 59-year-old vice president to have the "physical and mental resiliency" to be president.

Trump's approach has almost been worse than not putting out anything.

Despite having endeavored to successfully make Joe Biden's age

and health a significant campaign plank, the last we heard about Trump's health was a letter posted on his social media accounts almost a year ago by a personal doctor who provided no detail or results, only a vague assessment of "excellent" health.

Then there was the infamous 2015 letter by personal physician Dr. Harold Bornstein, who would later say that Trump had dictated the letter and then sent men to his office unannounced to seize Trump's medical records. This is, obviously, not the behavior of someone with nothing to hide.

Even under normal circumstances, there would be considerable questions surrounding a 78-year-old major party nominee, who if elected would become the oldest

person ever to assume the presidency.

Trump has given the American public little reason to grant him the benefit of the doubt.

The public deserves to know about Trump's physical and mental fitness, not just as a symbolic matter but a dire practical one.

When he got COVID in 2020 and had to be put on oxygen, it was a matter of highest national concern, even though the Trump White House tried to downplay the seriousness of his condition, which put him in Walter Reed Army Medical Center for three nights.

These are not considerations that should come down to guesswork (which, by the way, includes experts attempting to diagnose Trump from afar, and who aren't

helping here).

Trump owes it to voters to be transparent about his health, not that he's ever felt much of a degree of responsibility even to his own base.

The candidate's health records aren't the only documents missing from the public domain.

Don't forget that Trump has never published his tax returns.

He didn't do it when he ran in 2016, like every other contender.

He didn't do it for the four years he was in the Oval Office. And he's not done it in this, his third run for the White House.

Harris made her 1040s public every year she's been VP, including this year.

As with his never-released tax returns, Trump seems all too happy to break with past expectations while constantly promising he'll abide, someday.

He won't, because he believes he gets to do as he wishes and no one should question him.

But between now and Nov. 5 is when he is supposed to answer the questions of Americans.

Menopausal women have a lot at stake in this election

Perhaps you've heard: Menopause is having a moment.

Celebrities such as Oprah Winfrey and Drew Barrymore have begun speaking out about coping with symptoms and self-worth.

Halle Berry shouted from the steps of the Capitol: "I'm in menopause, OK?!"

As menopause advocates, we have long seen this "moment" as overdue, spurring necessary conversations for millions who would otherwise suffer through menopause in silence and shame.

It's a relief to see the topic discussed openly — even if some of the conversations are sparked by odd viral moments on the campaign trail, such as a recent remark by a Republican Senate candidate who thinks it's "a little crazy" that women past 50 would vote on the issue of reproductive rights.

It's not at all crazy — and bodily autonomy is not solely about pregnancy and abortion.

Menopausal women have a lot at stake on the ballot this year.

Like our younger counterparts, we too must be able to make informed choices about our health.

We deserve access to affordable, competent medical care and treatment from trained professionals.

We have every right and reason to demand lawmakers and political leaders invest in our well-being, our dignity, our humanity.

Nor are we some niche special interest group. There are legions of us, 75 million strong in the U.S., in some stage of perimenopause, menopause or post menopause.

Here are three issues critical to menopause care that we urge voters to consider.

MEDICAL RESEARCH FUNDS

First, equity in federal funding for medical research.

The National Institutes of Health allocates only 10.8% of its \$45 billion budget to women's health, according to the most recent tally (2020), although women make up more than half of the U.S. population.

Of that, only a tiny fraction goes to research targeting midlife and menopause — an amount so small it can't even be computed, given that menopause-specific research is part of a "subcategory of a subcategory," according to neuroscientist Lisa Mosconi.

In March, President Joe Biden signed an executive order creating a national task force, the White House Women's Health Research Initiative, with a call for a \$12 billion investment in women's midlife and menopause research.

As part of that commitment, just last month the U.S. Department of Defense announced a new \$500-million disbursement.

Meanwhile, Congress introduced a slate of bipartisan bills this session — the Advancing Menopause and Mid-Life Women's Health Act in the Senate and three corresponding proposals in the House — all of which would increase funding for research and education about menopause symptoms and treatments.

Those are all positive steps, and it is critical that they remain a priority for Congress and the White House.

We must pay attention to funding for women's health research when we go to the polls.

DOWN-BALLOT RACES

Second, menopause shows up in down-ballot races too. Governors, state legislators, city council members and other officials such as health com-

missioners and members of boards of regents can reinforce federal commitments via oversight roles — including of publicly funded universities and other entities that produce medical and scientific research.

Many of these offices also have the power to increase — or decrease — access to affordable care.

This summer Louisiana passed a historic law mandating insurance coverage of menopause treatments.

The California Assembly recently held public hearings about menopause in the workplace; the New Jersey Senate introduced legislation that would establish an interagency council on menopause to undertake research, disseminate evidence-based knowledge and develop state-supported treatment services.

Every candidate across the country should be called upon to support initiatives like these.

EDUCATION

Third, education is essential. Although half the population in the U.S. will experience menopause, most patients struggle to find a doctor who can help them.

Why? According to a Mayo Clinic survey, 20% of U.S.-based medical residents in the fields of obstetrics, family and internal medicine reported having zero menopause training; a mere 7% of those surveyed said they felt adequately prepared to treat menopausal patients.

One of the House bills, a bipartisan effort, would create a national public awareness campaign and fund nationwide medical education initiatives.

Licensing boards are already catching on: This month, the Federation of State Medical Boards agreed to provide continuing medical education credits for physicians who view a new PBS film on menopause, "The

M Factor" (for which one of us was an executive producer).

OTHER ISSUES HAVE EFFECT

Other issues at stake in this election, such as access to IVF and hormonal contraceptives — as well as threats to the independence of federal agencies including the National Institutes of Health, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the Food and Drug Administration — can also significantly affect the lives of women nearing or in menopause.

Voters who are menopausal — as well as those who have menopausal family members or may be on the brink of perimenopause themselves, typically women in their 30s and 40s — are a mighty force. Reproductive health is their fight too.

Anthropologist Margaret Mead famously stated: "There is no greater power in the world than the zest of a postmenopausal woman."

Zest is great. So is a robust policy agenda. Women should vote like their lives depend on it, because they do.

A guide on where to vote early in the 2024 general election

Election Day is just two weeks away. Soon, a bevy voters will head to the polls to elect a bevy of officials — including the next president.

While many will head to the polls on Tuesday, Nov. 5, voters can begin to cast their ballots at select local spots this Saturday, Oct. 26 during early voting, which runs through Sunday, Nov. 3. Read below for a guide on when and where to vote early.

In all counties, early voters are permitted to use any poll site. Voters who cast a ballot early will not be permitted to vote on Election Day. Those who have applied for an Early Vote by Mail or Absentee Ballot are not permitted to vote on the voting machines, but may be issued an Affidavit Ballot.

GREENE COUNTY

In Greene County, voters can cast early ballots on the fourth floor of the Greene County Office Building in Suite 430 at 411 Main St. in Catskill.

Early voting is open from Saturday, Oct. 26 through Sunday Nov. 3. On all days except



Bard College students attend HBCU Democracy Day

ANNANDALE-ON-HUDSON — A group of Bard students, enrolled in a course titled Student Voting: Power, Politics and Race in the Fight for American Democracy, attended HBCU Democracy Day at North Carolina Agricultural and Technical State University (North Carolina A&T) on Wednesday, Oct. 16 in Greensboro, North Carolina.

The course on student voting, which is supported by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation and the Open Society University Network (OSUN), is collaboratively taught by faculty from Bard College, North Carolina A&T, Prairie View A&M University, and Tuskegee University.

Students meet virtually every week to discuss issues in the course, including case studies which explore histories of student voting at each institution. Students from each of the campuses attended the HBCU Democracy Day conference.

The conference featured a panel with five of the professors who teach the course: Jelani Favors (North Carolina A&T) who organized Democracy Day and heads North Carolina A&T's Center of Excellence for Social Justice; Jonathan Becker (Bard College); Melanye Price (Prairie View A&M University); Lisa Bratton (Tuskegee University); and Yael Bromberg, who is a senior fellow at the Bard Center for Civic Engagement and a leading scholar on the history of the 26th Amendment, which lowered the voting age from 21 to 18.

The conference also included an array of distinguished speakers, including: David Dennis Sr., author and civil rights movement veteran;

Martha Jones, Society of Black Alumni Presidential Professor, professor of history and director of graduate studies at Johns Hopkins University; and Hasan Kwame Jeffries, associate professor of history at Ohio State University.

"It was an incredible educational experience for Bard students to be able to meet and engage in lively discussions with professors and students from some of the nation's leading HBCUs on critical issues facing the country on the eve of the presidential election," Bard College Professor of Political Studies and Vice President for Academic Affairs Jonathan Becker said. "It was even more meaningful, because the conference was held at North Carolina A&T, the home of the A&T (Greensboro) Four and so many other distinguished figures from the civil rights movement."

The attending Bard students expressed tremendous enthusiasm about their experience.

"It was amazing to see faculty and students that were so connected to their local community and to witness their pride in the role of their institution in the fight for civil rights," Emily O'Rourke '25, a senior majoring in anthropology who is pursuing a certificate in civic engagement said. "It was incredibly meaningful to meet face-to-face with students from the other campuses and together to participate in these necessary and important conversations about the history and future of democracy."

"It was an amazing experience to be able to go to an HBCU, to be able collaborate with students from other schools like North Carolina A&T, Tuskegee, and Prairie

View A&M, and to hear firsthand about their efforts to support voting and democracy," Kay Bell '26, a junior global and international studies major, said. "It makes me hopeful for the future of the country knowing that there are so many students involved in the fight for democracy."

The student voting course includes both written and video-documentary case studies about each of the participating campuses.

"It was incredibly fulfilling to see the illustrious campus of North Carolina A & T and to visit Greensboro's International Civil Rights Museum, which exposed me to the history that changed the nation," Masha Pankova, a graduate of Bard's Center human rights and the arts master's program who helped produce the documentary films, said. "It's one thing to read about it and another thing to see it firsthand."

Business owners in disaster areas should be wary of possible scams

NEW YORK (AP) — The devastation of Hurricanes Mil-

ton and Helene have opened the floodgates for people seeking disaster relief. Along with that comes the danger of fraud.

The Federal Trade Commission, Department of Justice and the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau are all warning consumers to be wary of identity theft, price gouging and other fraud.

Small business owners should stay alert too and recognize that the scammers can strike both online and in person.

"We've seen an uptick in cyberattacks during disasters," said Jennifer Butler, partner in disaster recovery at global advisory firm EisnerAmper. "Small businesses should really pay attention to that, really be aware of scams, of phishing attempts or potential cyberattacks on their systems. Because this is the time when, you know, those bad actors are going to come after small businesses."

Because small businesses might have a variety of employees and contractors com-

ing and going after a disaster as they seek to mitigate damage and reopen, owners should be vigilant about verifying the identity of anyone they're working with.

"Always ask for ID, documentation, those kinds of things," Butler said. No one should be asking for payment up front, particularly anyone that says they're from a government organization such as the Small Business Administration. "Make sure you're not paying anybody to help you if they're saying that they're from the federal government," she added.

Florida officials have said there are reports of scammers in the area who are posing as Federal Emergency Management Agency officials and trying to get financial information from the storm's victims.

If owners do suspect they may be a victim of fraud, contact FEMA to report any suspicious activity or potential fraud at 1-866-720-5721.

A UN report says it could take 350 years to rebuild Gaza

(AP) U.N. agencies have long warned that it could take decades to rebuild Gaza after Israel's offensive against Hamas, one of the deadliest and most destructive military campaigns since World War II.

Now, more than a year into the war, a new report speaks in terms of centuries.

The U.N. Conference on Trade and Development said in a report released Monday that if the war ends tomorrow and Gaza returns to the status quo before Hamas' Oct. 7, 2023, attack on Israel, it could take 350 years for its battered economy to return to its precarious prewar level.

Before the war, Gaza was under an Israeli and Egyptian blockade imposed after Hamas seized power in 2007. Four previous wars and divisions between Hamas and the Western-backed

Palestinian Authority in the West Bank also took a toll on Gaza's economy.

The current war has caused staggering destruction across the territory, with entire neighborhoods obliterated and roads and critical infrastructure in ruins. Mountains of rubble laced with decomposing bodies and unexploded ordnance would have to be cleared before rebuilding could begin.

"Once a ceasefire is reached, a return to the pre-October 2023 status quo would not put Gaza on the path needed for recovery and sustainable development," the report said. "If the 2007-2022 growth trend returns, with an average growth rate of 0.4 percent, it will take Gaza 350 years just to restore the GDP levels of 2022."

Even then, GDP per capita would decline "continuously and precipitously" as the population grows, it said.

Israeli officials did not respond to a request for comment on the report.

350 YEARS IS MORE OF A CALCULATION THAN A PREDICTION

Three hundred and fifty years is a long time. It would be as

though England and the Netherlands were only now recovering from the wars they fought against each other in the late 1600s.

Rami Alazzeq, author of the report, said he based the calculation on the decimation of the economy during the first seven months of the war, and how long it would take to restore it at the GDP growth rate Gaza averaged from 2007 until 2022. Gross domestic product, or GDP, is the sum total of all goods and services produced in a country or territory.

"The message is the recovery in Gaza depends on the conditions in which the recovery would happen," he said. "We're not saying that it will take Gaza 350 years to recover because that means that Gaza will never recover."

At the end of January, the World Bank estimated \$18.5 billion of damage — nearly the combined economic output of the West Bank and Gaza in 2022. That was before some intensely destructive Israeli ground operations, including in the southern border city of Rafah.

A U.N. assessment in Sep-

tember based on satellite footage found roughly a quarter of all structures in Gaza had been destroyed or severely damaged. It said around 66% of structures, including more than 227,000 housing units, had sustained at least some damage.

The Shelter Cluster, an international coalition of aid providers led by the Norwegian Refugee Council, calculated how long it would take to rebuild all the destroyed homes under what was known as the Gaza Reconstruction Mechanism. That process was established after the 2014 war to facilitate some reconstruction under heavy Israeli surveillance.

It found that under that setup, it would take 40 years to rebuild all the homes.

EVEN IN BEST-CASE CIRCUMSTANCES, RECOVERY COULD TAKE DECADES

The report says that even under the most optimistic scenario, with a projected growth rate of 10%, Gaza's recovery would still take decades.

"Assuming no military operation, and freedom of movement of goods and people and a significant level of investment, and population growth of 2.8 percent per year, UNCTAD estimates that Gaza's GDP per capita will return to its 2022 level by 2050," it said. A separate report released by the U.N. Development Program on Tuesday said that with major investment and the lifting of economic restrictions, the Palestinian economy as a whole, including the West Bank, could be back on track by 2034. In the absence of both, its predictions align with those of UNCTAD.

The more positive scenarios appear unlikely. Hamas-led militants killed

some 1,200 people, mostly civilians, and abducted another 250 when they stormed into southern Israel on Oct. 7, 2023. Around 100 captives are still inside Gaza, a third of whom are believed to be dead.

Israel's offensive has killed over 42,000 Palestinians, according to local health officials, who don't distinguish combatants from civilians but say more than half the dead are women and children. It has displaced around 90% of Gaza's population of 2.3 million, forcing hundreds of thousands into squalid tent camps.

Israel says the blockade is needed to prevent Hamas from importing arms and is unlikely to lift it as long as the group has a presence inside Gaza. Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu has said Israel will maintain open-ended security control over the territory.

Since May, Israel has controlled all of Gaza's border crossings. U.N. agencies and humanitarian groups say they have struggled to bring in food and emergency aid because of Israeli restrictions, ongoing fighting and the breakdown of law and order inside Gaza.

There's also no indication that international donors are willing to fund the rebuilding of Gaza as long as it remains in the grip of war or under Israeli occupation. Arab Gulf states like Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates have said they will only do so if there is a pathway to a Palestinian state, something to which Netanyahu is deeply opposed.

Meanwhile, the war rages with no end in sight.

This month, Israel launched another major operation in northern Gaza — the most heavily destroyed part of the territory — saying Hamas had regrouped there.

More frozen waffle and pancake products recalled

A recall of hundreds of frozen waffle products and other toaster foods sold in many U.S. grocery stores has expanded because they may be contaminated with dangerous listeria bacteria, the manufacturer said Tuesday.

TreeHouse Foods Inc., of Oak Brook, Illinois, said the updated recall includes all products made at a factory in Ontario, Canada, and sold at stores including Albertson's, Aldi, Dollar General, Kroger, Publix, Target, Walmart and others. The recall includes frozen toaster waffles, Belgian waffles and pancakes, the company said.

No illnesses linked to the recall have been confirmed.

The company is working with the U.S. and Canadian food safety regulators to resolve the problem. The recalled waffles are sold under a variety

This is the third large U.S. recall in recent months of foods potentially contaminated with listeria, a hardy bacteria that can be difficult to eradicate.

of names including Walmart's Great Value and Target's Good & Gather. A complete list of the affected products can be found on the TreeHouse website. Consumers should throw away the products or return them to stores for a refund.

TreeHouse officials issued a limited recall on Oct. 18 after routine testing found listeria at the Brantford, Ontario, factory. Additional testing indicated that

more manufacturing lines at the plant could be contaminated with the bacteria, the company said. Production was halted and the company said it intends to restart production after taking steps that include "deep cleaning, sanitation, hygienic restoration" and other procedures.

The company operates 26 sites in the U.S. and Canada that make private brand foods and beverages, according to its website. No other plants were affected, officials said.

Listeria infections can cause mild illness including fever and diarrhea or more serious problems. The illness is most dangerous to pregnant women, newborns, adults over 65 and people with weakened immune systems, according to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control. Symptoms can take up to 10 weeks to appear.

The CDC estimates that 1,600 people are infected with listeria each year in the United

States and 260 die.

This is the third large U.S. recall in recent months of foods potentially contaminated with listeria, a hardy bacteria that can be difficult to eradicate.

In July, Boar's Head Provision Co. Inc. of Sarasota, Florida, recalled more than 7 million pounds of deli meat and shut down its plant in Jarratt, Virginia, after deli meat contaminated with listeria led to at least 10 deaths and nearly 50 hospitalizations.

This month Oregon-based BrucePac recalled nearly 12 million pounds of meat and poultry processed at an Oklahoma plant after routine testing detected listeria.

Women in states with bans are getting abortions at similar rates as before

Women living in states with abortion bans obtained the procedure in the second half of 2023 at about the same rate as before the U.S. Supreme Court overturned Roe v. Wade, according to a report released Tuesday.

Women did so by traveling out of state or by having prescription abortion pills mailed to them, according to the #WeCount report from the Society of Family Planning, which advocates for abortion access. They increasingly used telehealth, the report found, as medical providers in states with laws intended to protect them from prosecution in other states used online appointments to prescribe abortion pills.

"The abortion bans are not eliminating the need for abortion," said Ushma Upadhyay, a University of California, San Francisco public health social scientist and a co-chair of the #WeCount survey. "People are jumping over these hurdles because they have to."

ABORTION PATTERNS HAVE SHIFTED

The #WeCount report began surveying abortion providers

across the country monthly just before Roe was overturned, creating a snapshot of abortion trends. In some states, a portion of the data is estimated. The effort makes data public with less than a six-month lag, giving a picture of trends far faster than the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, whose most recent annual report covers abortion in 2021.

The report has chronicled quick shifts since the Supreme Court's Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization ruling that ended the national right to abortion and opened the door to enforcement of state bans.

The number of abortions in states with bans at all stages of pregnancy fell to near zero. It also plummeted in states where bans kick in around six weeks of pregnancy, which is before many women know they're pregnant.

But the nationwide total has been about the same or above the level from before the ruling. The study estimates 99,000 abortions occurred each month in the first half of 2024, up from the 81,000 monthly from April through December 2022 and 88,000 in 2023.

One reason is telehealth, which got a boost when some

Democratic-controlled states last year began implementing laws to protect prescribers. In April 2022, about 1 in 25 abortions were from pills prescribed via telehealth, the report found. In June 2024, it was 1 in 5.

The newest report is the first time #WeCount has broken down state-by-state numbers for abortion pill prescriptions. About half the telehealth abortion pill prescriptions now go to patients in states with abortion bans or restrictions on telehealth abortion prescriptions.

In the second half of last year, the pills were sent to about 2,800 women each month in Texas, more than 1,500 in Mississippi and nearly 800 in Missouri, for instance.

TRAVEL IS STILL THE MAIN MEANS OF ACCESS FOR WOMEN IN STATES WITH BANS

Data from another group, the Guttmacher Institute, shows that women in states with bans still rely mostly on travel to get abortions.

By combining results of the two surveys and comparing them with Guttmacher's

counts of in-person abortions from 2020, #WeCount found women in states with bans throughout pregnancy were getting abortions in similar numbers as they were in 2020. The numbers do not account for pills obtained from outside the medical system in the earlier period, when those prescriptions most often came from abroad. They also do not tally people who received pills but did not use them.

West Virginia women, for example, obtained nearly 220 abortions monthly in the second half of 2023, mostly by traveling — more than in 2020, when they received about 140

a month. For Louisiana residents, the monthly abortion numbers were about the same, with just under 700 from July through December 2023, mostly through shield laws, and 635 in 2020. However, Oklahoma residents obtained fewer abortions in 2023, with the monthly number falling to under 470 from about 690 in 2020.

TELEHEALTH PROVIDERS EMERGED QUICKLY

One of the major providers of the telehealth pills is the Massachusetts Abortion Access Project. Co-founder Angel Foster said the group prescribed to about 500 patients

a month, mostly in states with bans, from its September 2023 launch through last month.

The group charged \$250 per person while allowing people to pay less if they couldn't afford that. Starting this month, with the help of grant funding that pays operating costs, it's trying a different approach: Setting the price at \$5 but letting patients know they'd appreciate more for those who can pay it. Foster said the group is on track to provide 1,500 to 2,000 abortions monthly with the new model.

Big offshore wind project proposed for NY; other sites evaluated

BRIGANTINE, N.J. (AP) — Offshore wind energy projects in New York, New Jersey and Maryland are moving forward, as federal regulators examine the proposals and opponents escalate their legal challenges to the work.

A large offshore wind farm is being proposed in the waters off New York as federal agencies are pressing ahead with reviews of seven other ocean sites.

Community Offshore Wind, a partnership between Essen, Germany-based RWE and New York-based National Grid, on Friday proposed a wind farm that would generate 2.8 gigawatts of electricity, or enough to power 1 million homes.

The company also has an active proposal to build a separate project in New Jersey off the coast of Long Beach Island.

It says its New York project

is the largest offshore wind project ever proposed to New York regulators, although it did not say approximately how many wind turbines it might build there.

"New York and New Jersey are both pursuing some of the most ambitious clean energy goals in the country, and offshore wind will be critical to each state's success," said Dan

Sieger, the company's head of development. He said the project would be built 64 miles (100 kilometers) off the New York coast and 37 miles (60 kilometers) from New Jersey.

In July, Community Offshore Wind submitted plans to build an offshore wind facility in New Jersey that could power 500,000 homes.

On Monday, the U.S. Bureau

of Ocean Energy Management released an environmental review of six offshore wind sites covering nearly a half million acres (200,000 hectares) in New York and New Jersey, examining their possible impacts on marine life, shorebirds, air and water quality and other areas.

It found that offshore wind projects could impact marine mammals and fish during construction, though they predicted such impacts would be temporary.

But it also wrote that even with mitigation and monitoring procedures in place, "development would still result in unavoidable adverse impacts" including an increased risk of temporary or permanent hearing loss in whales and other marine mammals, higher risk of death for sea turtles struck by vessels and birds struck by turbine blades, and alteration

of ocean views from shore.

The American Clean Power Association called the environmental review "a vital step" toward getting new projects approved efficiently.

On Tuesday, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration determined that construction of a 32-acre (13-hectare) facility in New York City where offshore wind towers will be assembled "is likely to adversely affect, but is not likely to jeopardize" the continued existence of sea turtles or Atlantic sturgeon in the area. The Arthur Kill Terminal Project is being planned for the Staten Island section of New York.

That same day, in a review of a seventh proposed site, the agency also said a Maryland offshore wind project is not expected to kill or seriously injure any marine mammal species.

The Maryland Offshore Wind

Project could see 114 wind turbines, four offshore substation platforms and up to four offshore export cable corridors built about 11.5 miles (18.5 kilometers) off that state's coast. Two phases, known as MarWin and Momentum Wind, already have preliminary state approval.

And the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency recently granted New Jersey's Atlantic Shores wind farm project a permit under the federal Clean Air Act. That led one of many vocal opposition groups to add to its legal challenges to the project.

The grassroots nonprofit Save LBI is appealing the approval, and has filed notice of its intent to sue the EPA. Bob Stern, the group's president, said the agency did not adequately consider potential air quality impacts on the Brigantine National Wilderness Area and the Edwin B. Forsythe National Wildlife Refuge.

Revolutionary Guard official charged in alleged plot to kill activist

NEW YORK (AP) — Federal prosecutors on Tuesday charged a senior Iranian military official and three others with links to that country's government with plotting to kill an Iranian American author on U.S. soil — a development lauded by the alleged target.

"This is a beautiful day for me. It's like I've been given a second life," Masih Alinejad said of her reaction after eight FBI agents and Justice Department officials told her about the charges filed against Brig. Gen. Ruhollah Bazghandi, a senior

official in Iran's Revolutionary Guard, and three other men.

Bazghandi, who previously served as chief of the Revolutionary Guard's counterintelligence department, and the three other defendants live in Iran and remain at large, according to prosecutors. Five others were previously charged in the alleged plot, including three people who are in custody.

Alinejad, 48, said she "screamed out of joy" when she was first told of the new charges and how they show that the Iranian government was involved in the plot against her.

She hugged each of the agents and officials before breaking into tears.

"Oh my god. I love America. Thank you," she recalled telling them.

Alinejad, an author and contributor to Voice of America, fled Iran following the country's disputed 2009 presidential election. She said she found it remarkable to live in a country now where government authorities work to protect her even though "I am criticizing them everywhere."

Attorney General Merrick B. Garland said in a news release

that the United States "will not tolerate efforts by an authoritarian regime like Iran to undermine the fundamental rights guaranteed to every American."

He added: "Three of the defendants charged in this horrific plot are now in U.S. custody, and we will never stop working to identify, find, and bring to justice all those who endanger the safety of the American people."

In January 2023, prosecutors unsealed charges alleging that members of an Eastern European crime group engaged in a plot to murder Alinejad, although she was not identified

by name in court papers or government releases.

The Iranian opposition activist and journalist has been living in exile in New York City. She confirmed to the AP that she was the intended target.

In the news release, U.S. Attorney Damian Williams said the U.S. hopes that Tuesday's charges against Iran-based defendants will "strike another public blow at the heart of the Government of Iran's efforts to execute the victim — as well as its lethal targeting, intimidation, and repression of other Iranian dissidents."

Harris and Trump jostle for edge on Mideast conflict

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two weeks out from Election Day, the crisis in the Middle East is looming over the race for the White House, with one candidate struggling to find just the right words to navigate its difficult cross-currents and the other making bold pronouncements that the age-old conflict can quickly be set right.

Vice President Kamala Harris has been painstakingly — and not always successfully — trying to balance talk of strong support for Israel with harsh condemnations of

civilian casualties among Palestinians and others caught up in Israel's wars against Hamas in Gaza and Hezbollah in Lebanon.

Former President Donald Trump, for his part, insists that none of this would have happened on his watch and that he can make it all go away if elected.

Both of them are bidding for the votes of Arab and Muslim American voters and Jewish voters, particularly in extremely tight races in the battleground states of Michigan and Pennsylvania.

Harris over the weekend alternately drew praise and

criticism over her comments about a pro-Palestinian protester that were captured on a widely shared video. Some took Harris' remark that the protester's concerns were "real" to be an expression of agreement with his description of Israel's conduct as "genocide." That drew sharp condemnation from Israel's former ambassador to the U.S., Michael Oren.

But Harris' campaign said that while the vice president was agreeing more generally about the plight of civilians in Gaza, she was not and would not accuse Israel of genocide.

A day earlier, the dynamics

were reversed when Harris told reporters that the "first and most tragic story" of the conflict was the Oct. 7 Hamas attack last year that killed about 1,200 Israelis. That was triggering to those who feel she is not giving proper weight to the deaths of the more than 41,000 Palestinians who have been killed in Gaza.

Trump, meanwhile, in recent days has participated in interviews with Saudi-owned Al-Arabiya and Lebanese outlet MTV, where he promised to bring about peace and said "things will turn out very well" in Lebanon.

In a post on his social media

platform Monday, he predicted a Harris presidency would only make matters in the Mideast worse.

"If Kamala gets four more years, the Middle East will spend the next four decades going up in flames, and your kids will be going off to War, maybe even a Third World War, something that will never happen with President Donald J. Trump in charge," Trump posted. "For our Country's sake, and for your kids, Vote Trump for PEACE!"

Harris' position is particularly awkward because as vice president she is tethered to President Joe Biden's foreign

policy decisions even as she's tried to strike a more empathetic tone to all parties. But Harris aides and allies also are frustrated with what they see as Trump largely getting a pass on some of his unpredictable foreign policy statements.

"It's the very thoughtful, very careful school versus the showboat," said James Zogby, founder and president of the Arab American Institute, who has endorsed Harris. "That does become a handicap in these late stages when he's making all these overtures. When the bill comes due they're going to walk away empty-handed, but by then it'll be too late."

Zelensky: Only a US green light will sway reluctant Germany

KYIV, Ukraine (AP) — Ukraine's president is hoping allies will take a more positive stance on his so-called "victory plan" after the U.S. election, but concedes that its key demand — an invitation to join NATO — is not welcome by some major Western partners, in particular Germany.

Volodymyr Zelensky said Russia was also likely looking at the postelection scenario in the U.S. to assess the possibility of cease-fire talks with Ukraine. He assessed that if partial cease-fire deals could be reached over attacks on energy infrastructure and Black Sea shipping routes, it would signal the end of the "hot phase" of the war.

Zelensky spoke to journal-

ists on Monday and his comments were embargoed until Tuesday.

He said the U.S. is analyzing his plan, but he doesn't expect a meaningful response until after the Nov. 5 election.

"They said, yes, we've started working on the Victory Plan, they want to analyze everything, and so on. But it's very clear to me that all the major partners, especially during the election period, will be afraid of Russia's reaction," he said. "Because they understand that with this package, we can destroy them."

On NATO, Zelensky said France, Britain and Italy have shown signs of support. Germany has reservations, however, and Zelensky believes only a U.S. green light will convince

Berlin to accept the idea.

"But the fact is that the German side is skeptical about our NATO membership — that's a fact. I believe their stance is softer than it was before — this is also a fact.

"But when it comes to the invitation I'm talking about now, they are afraid of ... Russia's reaction," he said.

"I believe that their position will be influenced by a bigger alliance. A bigger alliance in supporting us — a confident 'Yes' from the United States."

Many significant issues will hinge on decisions taken following the fraught election period, the president said.

"After the elections, we hope for a more positive reaction from the U.S. — not because of a change in the president, but because the focus of the United States is now on the elections, and I believe that any sharp statements from the U.S. today might be inappropriate or carry risks. I think they don't want unnecessary risks," he said.

Asked if he faced pressure from allies to end the war, Zelensky joked, saying, "Over the

years, people's overall blood pressure rises."

He dismissed reports of a possible cease-fire scenario in which Ukraine exchanged occupied territories for NATO membership.

"We are not discussing this. But I think that these media leaks are not accidental. Perhaps some partners may have such thoughts. They don't communicate this directly with me, but through the media, it's clear they're testing its reception."

He said the end of the "hot phase" of the war would commence if a deal could be reached with Russia to halt attacks on energy infrastructure and Black Sea ports and shipping routes. In this case, attacks on military targets would continue as well as front-line fighting, he said.

He said he plans to convince countries of the Global South to embrace Ukraine's plan as another way to push Moscow to agree to Kyiv's terms.

Zelensky said his country is not pursuing nuclear weapons to deter Russian President Vladimir Putin.

"We are not asking to be given or returned nuclear weapons," he said. "My position is very clear. We gave them up, but we got nothing in return. And we only received a full-scale war and many casualties, so today we have only one way out. That's why we need NATO, because we don't have the weapons that can stop Putin."

With former President Donald Trump's encouragement, Republicans are voting early again, flocking to the polls for in-person voting ahead of Election Day and helping push the national number above 17 million.

The early turnout is breaking records in swing states such as Georgia and North Carolina.

The GOP hopes this surge of early votes will fix a mechanical problem that some in the party blame for costing it the 2020 presidential election and key races in 2022. Campaigns usually want their voters to cast ballots ahead of Election Day so they can focus their resources on getting more marginal supporters to the polls at the last minute.

Republicans excelled at that

before Trump turned against early in-person and mail voting in 2020, as he spun wild conspiracies about the process and convinced his supporters to wait until Election Day to cast their ballots. But the party is again pushing its voters to cast their ballots early, and the former president is largely encouraging the change.

"I am telling everyone to vote early," Trump said on a podcast last week hosted by conservative Dan Bongino, who has widely spread false information about early voting and the 2020 election.

Republicans seem to be responding. In North Carolina, where in 2022 Democrats had an edge of more than 30 percentage points at this stage of early voting, they are ahead by just 2 percentage

points this year, according to Associated Press election research. In Nevada, where Democrats for decades relied on a robust early vote to counter the GOP on Election Day, about 6,000 more Republicans than Democrats had actually cast early ballots this year as of Tuesday.

It's unclear what this means for the election, however. The early vote data only reveals whether voters are registered with a party, not who they are voting for, and the early electorate can change from day to day as more people vote early.

The surge in 2020 Democratic early voting was largely a reaction to a pandemic that no longer exists, skewing historic comparisons.

And what might seem like demographic trends in the

early vote can suddenly disappear once Election Day votes are factored in.

It also is still very early in the voting process. The last of the seven swing states, Wisconsin, kicked off its early voting Tuesday morning, and the 174 million voters who already have cast ballots this year represent only about 11% of the number of total ballots in the 2020 presidential election. Parties can run up leads in the early vote and then see them vanish on Election Day because all their supporters have already cast ballots and the other side has not.

"The Democrats are still, as far as I can tell, banking more early votes. It's just less of a disadvantage for Republicans," said Michael McDonald, a political scientist at the University of Florida.

Russia is behind the viral disinformation targeting Walz: intelligence official

WASHINGTON (AP) — Groups in Russia created and helped spread viral disinformation targeting Democratic vice presidential candidate Tim Walz, a senior U.S. intelligence official said Tuesday.


The content, which includes baseless accusations about the Minnesota governor's time as a teacher, contains several indications that it was manipulated, said the official with the Office of the Director of National Intelligence.

Analysts identified clues that linked the content to Russian disinformation operations, said the official, who briefed reporters on the condition of anonymity under rules set by the office of the director.

Digital researchers had already linked the video to Russia, but Tuesday's announcement is the first time federal authorities have confirmed the connection.

The disinformation targeting Walz is consistent with Russian disinformation seeking to undermine the Democratic campaign of Vice President Kamala Harris and Walz, her running mate. Russia also has spread disinformation aimed at stoking discord and division ahead of voting, officials said, and may seek to encourage violent protests after Election Day.

Last month, analysts at Microsoft revealed that a viral video that baselessly claimed Harris left a woman paralyzed in a hit-and-run accident 13 years ago was Russian disinformation. More recently, a video surfaced featuring a man claiming to be a former student

of Walz's who accused the candidate of sexual misconduct years ago. Private researchers at firms that track disinformation, including NewsGuard, already have concluded the video was fake and that the man in the footage isn't who he claimed to be.

Some researchers have also suggested the video may contain evidence that it was created using artificial intelligence, but federal officials stopped short of the same conclusion, saying only that the video contained multiple indications of manipulation.

China and Iran also have sought to influence the U.S. election using online disinformation. While Russia has targeted the Democratic campaign, Iran has gone after Republican Donald Trump with disinformation as well as hacking into the former

president's campaign. China, meanwhile, has focused its influence efforts on down-ballot races, and on general efforts to sow distrust and democratic dissatisfaction.

There is no indication that Russia, China or Iran are plotting significant attacks on election infrastructure as a way to disrupt the outcome, officials said Tuesday.

Jen Easterly, director of the U.S. Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency, has said improvements to election security mean there is no way any other foreign adversary will be able to alter the results.

Russia, China and Iran have all rejected claims that they are seeking to meddle with the U.S. election. Messages left with the Russian embassy seeking comment on the Walz video were not immediately returned.

South Korea warns it can send arms to Ukraine after reports of North's troops in Russia

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — South Korea warned Tuesday it could consider supplying weapons to Ukraine in response to North Korea allegedly dispatching troops to Russia, as both North Korea and Russia denied the movements.

The South Korean statement is apparently meant to pressure Russia not to bring in North Korean troops in its war against Ukraine. South Korean officials worry that Russia may reward North Korea by giving it sophisticated weapons technologies that can boost the North's nuclear and missile programs that target South Korea.

In an emergency National Security Council meeting, top South Korean officials condemned North Korea's alleged dispatch of troops as "a grave security threat" to South Korea and the international community. They described North Korea as "a criminal group" that forces its youths to serve as Russian mercenaries for an unjustifiable war, the South Ko-

rean presidential office said in a statement.

The officials agreed to take phased countermeasures, linking the level of their responses to progress in Russian-North Korean military cooperation, according to the statement.

Possible steps include diplomatic, economic and military options, and South Korea could consider sending both defensive and offensive weapons to Ukraine, a senior South Korean presidential official told reporters on condition of anonymity in a background briefing.

The official said North Korea could attempt to get high-tech Russian technologies to perfect its nuclear missiles. The official said Russia's possible help for North Korea's efforts to modernize its outdated conventional weapons systems and acquire a space-based surveillance system would pose a serious security threat to South Korea as well.

NORTH KOREA, RUSSIA INTENSIFY COOPERATION
Since Russia's invasion of

Ukraine in 2022, South Korea has joined U.S.-led sanctions against Moscow and shipped humanitarian and financial support to Kyiv. But it has avoided directly supplying arms to Ukraine in line with its policy of not supplying weapons to countries actively engaged in conflicts.

South Korea's spy agency said last week it had confirmed that North Korea sent 1,500 special operation forces to Russia this month. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy has said his government had intelligence that 10,000 North Korea soldiers were being prepared to join invading Russian forces.

North Korea and Russia have been sharply boosting their cooperation in the past two years. In June, they signed a major defense deal requiring both countries to use all available means to provide immediate military assistance if either is attacked. South Korea said at the time it would consider sending arms to Ukraine, a similar statement that it made Tuesday.



GM's best day in years offsets GE Aerospace tumble

NEW YORK (AP) — U.S. stock indexes barely budged after a quiet day of mixed trading on Tuesday.

The S&P 500 edged down by less than 0.1%. It was a tiny loss, but it still marked the first back-to-back drop for the index in a month and a half. The index fell modestly on Monday after coming off a sixth straight winning week, its longest such streak of the year.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average slipped 6 points, or less than 0.1%. Like the S&P 500, it's been on a long, record-breaking rally and set its all-time high on Friday. The Nasdaq composite rose 0.2%.

General Motors jumped 10.4% for its best day since

2020 after delivering stronger profit and revenue for the latest quarter than analysts expected. It benefited from stronger sales to individual U.S. customers, even as sales slowed to large fleet buyers.

Philip Morris International was another one of the strongest forces pushing upward on the S&P 500 and rallied 10.5% after topping forecasts for both profit and revenue. CEO Jacek Olczak said the company is seeing momentum across regions and business lines, including growth for both its smoke-free business and for its combustible cigarettes.

Norfolk Southern climbed 4.9% after the railroad topped analysts' forecasts for profit. Trump Media & Technology

Group jumped another 9.9% to bring its gain to 183% since hitting a bottom late last month. The company behind former President Donald Trump's Truth Social platform is still losing money, but it tends to move more with the perceived chances of Trump's reelection than anything else. It's back above \$34, but it's still well below its peak above \$66 reached in March.

Keeping indexes in check was GE Aerospace, which tumbled 9% and was the heaviest weight on the S&P 500. The company, which began trading independently this spring after splitting off from the former conglomerate General Electric, reported stronger profit for the latest quarter than an-

alysts expected, but its revenue fell short of forecasts.

Verizon Communications sank 5% after likewise reporting weaker revenue for the latest quarter than expected, even though its profit edged past forecasts.

Genuine Parts, which sells automotive and industrial replacement parts, dropped 21% for the largest loss in the S&P 500 after its profit for the latest quarter fell well short of expectations. CEO Will Stengel said much of the shortfall was due to continued weakness in Europe and its industrial business.

Sherwin-Williams sank 5.3% after both its profit and revenue came in weaker than analysts expected. CEO Heidi Petz

cited a "tough macroeconomic environment" and "continued choppiness in the demand environment" for its paints and coatings. Demand from do-it-yourself customers in North America remains weak given the higher debt levels that they're carrying and still-lingering inflation.

All told, the S&P 500 slipped 2.78 points to 5,851.20. The Dow dipped 6.71 to 42,924.89, and the Nasdaq composite rose 33.12 to 18,573.13.

Stocks have slowed their record-breaking momentum last week under increasing pressure from rising Treasury yields in the bond market.

The yield on the 10-year Treasury held steady at 4.20%, where it was late Monday.

Flying air taxis move closer to US takeoff

Federal regulators gave a strong push to electric-powered air taxis Wednesday by issuing a final rule for operating the aircraft and how pilots will be trained to fly them.

The head of the Federal Aviation Administration, Mike Whitaker, said the rule recognizes air taxis as an entirely new type of aircraft that will soon join airplanes and helicopters in the sky.

These aircraft take off and land vertically, like helicopters, but fly like fixed-wing planes. Many companies are working to get them on the market, but they have been held back by the lack of clarity over regulations to govern their use.

Whitaker said the FAA is stressing safety as it works to fold the new aircraft into the nation's airspace. He said "powered-lift aircraft" are the first new category of aircraft in nearly 80 years, since the dawn of helicopters, and the rule will allow for their widespread operation.

Air taxi supporters call them a cleaner alternative to passenger planes that burn jet fuel. So far, however, current technology limits their size and likely means that they will be used most often in urban areas.

Taxpayers will get bigger standard deductions for 2025 tax year

NEW YORK (AP) — U.S. taxpayers will again see higher standard deductions for 2025, allowing them to shield more of their money from taxation on future returns.

The Internal Revenue Service detailed the increases in its annual inflation adjustments announced Tuesday. For single taxpayers and married individuals filing separately in tax year 2025, the standard deduction is rising to \$15,000 — up \$400 from 2024.

For couples who file jointly,

that standard deduction will be \$30,000 for 2025, an \$800 jump from the year prior. And heads of households will get a \$22,500 standard deduction, up \$600 from 2024.


Income thresholds for all seven federal tax bracket levels were also revised upward. The top tax rate, which remains 37%, will cover incomes greater than \$626,350 for single taxpayers in tax year 2025, for example — compared to \$609,350 in 2024.

The IRS makes such adjustments for each tax year to account for inflation, which has recently been on a downward

trend. Last month, inflation in the U.S. dropped to its lowest point in more than three years, marking some encouraging economic news — but Americans are still feeling some key price pressures.

"Core" prices, a gauge of underlying inflation, remained elevated in September, driven up by rising costs for medical care, clothing, auto insurance and airline fares.

While taxpayers will again see higher standard deductions for 2025, the increases announced Tuesday are less than those seen in recent years.

SCHOOL CROSS COUNTRY

Young, improved runners Waring and Eutz setting the example for small, focused Chatham team

BY CHRISTIAN HINCE

Chatham's cross country team has a very short roster list.

With just four athletes, coach Katharine Curtis says this makes the team's approach to goals pretty simple.

"It's all about the individual, so just bettering yourself, bettering your own times, doing what you can out there and not letting the big schools [intimidate you], and I think they're getting more used to this."

This simple focus on self-improvement has especially worked for Chatham's top pair of runners, Madeline Waring and George Eutz.

Waring, an eighth grader, is both the team's youngest runner and only female athlete. Despite being the only Panther competing in her races, this isn't something she's bothered by.

"I actually prefer it because I can pace with them which gets me better times, so it's fine," she said.

Waring has been one of the strongest runners in the Patroon Conference this year, placing first overall in meets such as an Oct. 1 contest against Catskill and Hudson and a Sept. 24 showing against

Taconic Hills and Hawthorne Valley.

Her best time so far was a 20:24 finish at the Burnt Hills-Ballston Lake Invitational on the 12th, good for 79th out of 462 varsity runners. Having just started cross country a season ago, Waring is proud of her progress in year two.

"I definitely think I've gotten better form-wise, [and my] stride I have improved," she said. "I feel like I've improved a lot this year, because I've really started to focus."

Curtis called Waring a "goofball," but thinks the middle schooler's output as a runner in 2024 comes from strong intangibles as an athlete.

"She's competitive," Curtis said. "She doesn't like to lose, so she just pushes

herself, does more than she thinks she is capable of, and can just go out there and just get the results."

Waring isn't the only Chatham runner who started in seventh grade. Eutz, a sophomore, is in his fourth year on the team. His experience with long distance goes further than this though, as he remembers going on runs alongside his sister who was also involved in cross country.

This season has been a year of progress for him, finishing in the 19-20 minute range in mid-September before dipping below 18 minutes for the BHBL Invitational on the 12th. Eutz says this growth is something he's worked towards.

"I practiced over the summer, and that showed much improvement," he said. "I'd say I owe it to that."

His practice has yielded strong league showings as well, finishing first overall in both the Oct. 1 conference meet and the Sept. 24 race against Taconic Hills and Hawthorne Valley, who boasts a league second-best record of 5-0.

Ichabod Crane's LaTorre rallies for medalist honors

Sophomore fires 68 in final round

HALFMOON — Ichabod Crane sophomore Tanner LaTorre refuses to look at the leaderboard when he plays in tournaments. But that doesn't mean he doesn't have a good idea where he stands and how to clinch the deal.

Playing smart golf all afternoon, LaTorre rallied from three shots back and shot a 4-under-par 68 in the final round to win medalist honors at the Section 2 ABC/D Boys' Golf Playoffs/State Qualifier Tuesday at Fairways of Halfmoon. Although he didn't know it at the time, his 20-foot birdie on the final hole secured his position as Section 2 champion with a two-day total of 5-under-par 139, just one stroke ahead of CBA's CJ Strong (70-140), who birdied the 17th hole and nearly holed out a bunker shot on the final hole that

would have tied LaTorre.

Also earning spots on the Section 2 team that will compete at the NYSPHSAA Championship next June 8-9 at Mill Creek Golf Club in Churchville were first-round leader Sean Roddy of Guilderland (73-141), Carter Sica of Saratoga Springs (68-143), Brady Carrow of Voorheesville (75-146), Adam DeGregory of Schuylerville (77-146), Jeffrey Fumarola of Ballston Spa (73-148), Cooper LaBarge of Cobleskill-Richmondville (79-149) and Kai Chiarenza of Shenendehowa (78-149).

Ceko Cupp of Saratoga Springs (78-150) and Justin Carlson of Albany Academy (77-151) earned the two alternate spots.

LaTorre is building quite a resume. This summer, he won the NYS Boys' 14-and-under

After thrilling season ends in NLCS, surprising Mets have 'work to do'

NEW YORK (AP) — Yes, the New York Mets have much to feel good about following a rousing run of unexpected success this season.

All those warm fuzzies were warranted.

Now, the cold reality: Pete Alonso's uncertain future is far from the only priority this winter.

New York probably will have about a dozen free agents to replace — including Alonso — once contract options are decided, and the pitching staff is particularly thin at the moment.

"We might look extremely different," star shortstop Francisco Lindor said.

The good news is the Mets have an owner with deep pockets, an established core that has playoff experience — and perhaps more than \$100 million coming off their payroll as they look to build on a surprise appearance in the National League Championship Series.

"We have everybody we need to make this work and finish the job," outfielder Brandon Nimmo said.

What was projected as a transition season under rookie manager Carlos Mendoza and first-year president of baseball operations David Stearns, with an eye toward 2025, instead

morphed from a 22-33 start into a thrilling October ride that finally ended Sunday two wins short of the World Series with a Game 6 loss to the Los Angeles Dodgers.

New York pulled off a string

of stirring comebacks under pressure and hit several clutch home runs, creating fond memories that will last forever.

"We became a family. And now we raised the bar," Mendoza said in Los Angeles. "Ex-

pectations now, this is what we should strive for every year, to be playing deep into October."

To do that, owner Steve Cohen has holes to fill on the field.

How to watch Dodgers-Yankees, betting odds, ticket prices and more

BY DAVID BRANDT

Sometimes, it really does help to have all that money.

The big-spending Los Angeles Dodgers and New York Yankees will meet in a matchup of World Series heavyweights starting Friday at Dodger Stadium. The Yankees ranked second in payroll this season at \$311 million while the Dodgers were third at \$266 million, according to MLB's latest projections.

The two franchises are among the sport's most successful. The Yankees just won their 41st American League pennant and the Dodgers their 25th National League championship.

New York is seeking its 28th World Series title but first since 2009, the Dodgers their eighth and second in a five-year span.

Here's a look at some things to watch as the series begins Friday:

OHTANI VS. JUDGE

The series pits two of this generation's great sluggers against one another: LA's Shohei Ohtani vs. New York's Aaron Judge.

Ohtani became the first player in baseball history to hit 50 homers and steal 50 bases in a regular season, reaching

the milestone Sept. 19 with his second of three homers against the Marlins. He's largely kept up that production in the playoffs, batting .286 with three homers and 10 RBIs.

Judge had another mammoth regular season, leading the big leagues with 58 homers. He also hit .322 with 144 RBIs. The 32-year-old has been a little quiet in these playoffs, batting .161 with two homers and six RBIs.

UNSUNG HEROES

The Ohtani vs. Judge matchup is sure to command the most attention, but both teams have other players who have starred so far in October.

Veteran slugger Giancarlo Stanton is having an excellent postseason, batting .294 with five homers and 11 RBIs, earning the AL Championship Series MVP. The 34-year-old has struggled with injuries and inconsistency since joining the Yankees in 2018 but could cement his spot in franchise lore with a big World Series.

The Dodgers are pushing through October with an unlikely middle-of-the-order threat — the 5-foot-10, 193-pound Tommy Edman.

Junior Amateur Championship. He's won 11 NENY PGA Junior Tour titles, including a couple of majors, and was a player of the year for his age group. LaTorre also competed in the national Drive, Chip and Putt Championship at Augusta National Golf Club during Masters week a few years ago. In his fourth season on the Riders' varsity team, he shot a 6-under-par 30 at Olde Kinderhook GC during a Colonial Council league match and then carded another 6-under-par, this time for a 66 over 18 holes, to win the league tournament at Eagle Crest.

Tuesday, he registered five birdies, including three in a row, and also tacked on an eagle on the ninth hole and that key birdie on the 18th hole.

"On the 18th hole, I was 120 yards to the pin and I hit a pitching wedge," he noted. "I kind of toed it a little bit, but it got on the green. When I came up to the green I didn't know where I was [in the standings].

But it was nice to see the putt go in. I never look at the scoreboard. I just don't want to get too nervous. I don't want to be thinking I've got to birdie this hole. It gets into my head."

The flat stick was LaTorre's favorite weapon in the final round.

"I definitely played better today," he said. "My putting wasn't that good in the beginning, but after I holed out on the ninth hole from the bunker, I started hitting my approach shots closer, and I started to make some putts. I think that putt on the 18th hole was my longest."

LaTorre said he's proud of his most recent accomplishment.

"It feels pretty good doing it in my sophomore year," he said. "Hopefully, I can do it again next year and the year after that."

Strong said he, too, didn't glance at the scoreboard until the 16th hole.

"When I got to the 17th hole, I decided to play aggressively, which probably wasn't that great of an idea considering that pin," he said. "But it worked out with that birdie."

On the 18th hole, I hit my tee shot up the 10th hole, because I don't like flirting with the right side. I hit a good iron shot, but it went into the bunker. I didn't know if Tanner had made a birdie on the 18th hole, so I tried to hole that bunker shot."

It will be Strong's first appearance at the state tournament after several years of coming close.

"The ultimate goal is to get to states," he said. "Today, my driver felt really comfortable. My irons were iffy but the putter in my bag was really good. The putter was definitely the best part of my game today."

Roddy, the first-round leader, remained in contention for the overall Section 2 title, but a double bogey on the par-3 17th hole slowed him down.

"On the 17th hole, I figured I didn't want to come up short, but I hit it too hard and it landed in the back bunker. I didn't want to take too much of a swing [with water surrounding the green], but I slapped it out and then three-putted."

"Golf happens," he said about the double bogey. "I ended up knocking in a birdie on the 18th hole, which is great. I played the back nine conservatively. The whole day, I hit it to the center of the green, but my putts didn't drop. But I can't complain about the way I played. [Getting to] states was the real goal."

Class A medalist Chiarenza, a junior at Shenendehowa who started the day three shots off the lead, had a frustrating final round with a 78 that included a 10 on the par-5 16th hole after he hit his tee shot into the high fescue along the left side of the fairway and had difficulty reaching the green. But he still salvaged the final spot for the state team with a 149.

"It was unfortunate," Chiarenza said. "But I got away with it and I'm going to the state tournament. Off the tee, I yanked it left. It can happen when you are under pressure and there are so many good players out there. I just couldn't get good contact on the ball [from the fescue]."

Sica matched LaTorre for the best round of the day with a 68.

Curtis is proud of his success on a personal level.

"You can see such a change in just how he carries himself," she said. "I think that's just given him a boost of confidence, and he's doing really, really well this year."

Having known Eutzky for all four of his years in cross country, she feels he's come out of his shell in a new way this season.

"I think George by himself, he's that quiet leader type, so now that he is talking a little bit more, it just helps him there," she said.

Curtis says that both Eutzky and Waring, despite neither being older athletes on the team, which consists of one senior, set a strong example for the other two runners.

"When they're out doing warm ups and drills, they usually lead it," she said. "When

they're on their easy runs, they usually set the pace, where they're going, where they're doing their run that day. When we give them the option so they take over, it's a nice change."

With the Patroon Conference championships next Tuesday and sectionals on Nov. 9, both runners look to focus on the right things headed into the postseason.

"[I want to] push myself to do better, but overall not worry about it as much, because the more you worry about it, the more you get in your head, and that can result in not as good results," Waring said.

In the future, Curtis thinks that Eutzky and Waring could build legacies as athletes at Chatham.

"If they stick with it, they're going to be some of the best runners that we've had here," she said. "We've had some good runners that have made it to states, some teams that have made it, but I think their names will be right up there with them."

They start of course with Alonso, the fan-favorite first baseman who was drafted by the Mets in 2016 and already ranks third on the franchise list with 226 career homers in six major league seasons — one that was shortened by the pandemic.

The four-time All-Star, who played in all 175 games for New York this year, delivered in October with a pair of three-run homers to help win elimination games and finished the postseason with four homers, 10 RBIs and a .999 OPS.

"I want more moments like this," Alonso said. "I'm really proud of what I was able to accomplish here. I feel like I laid it out there every day."

Alonso, who turns 30 in December, is represented by agent Scott Boras, who often likes to test the market with high-profile clients.

It's difficult to forecast exactly what kind of contract

Alonso will get this offseason, but he would seem a good fit for several potential suitors — including the Astros, Cubs, Giants, Nationals, Red Sox and Yankees.

Cohen and the Mets might be more focused on an even bigger free agent fish, outfielder Juan Soto. Or perhaps New York will end up retaining Alonso the same way it did Nimmo and closer Edwin Díaz after the 2022 playoff season.

If not, the Mets could move young slugger Mark Vientos from third base to first and give Brett Baty another shot at third. Touted prospect Ronny Mauricio, who debuted in 2023 before missing this season with a knee injury, also could be in the mix.


New York needs a designated hitter, because Jesse Winker and J.D. Martinez can become free agents. Rookie speedster Luisangel Acuña could challenge for playing time at second base, where Jeff McNeil is coming off a rocky season, or in center field, where Tyrone Taylor is eligible for arbitration

and Harrison Bader hits free agency again.

The bullpen must be largely rebuilt in front of Díaz, while the late-season rotation probably returns only David Peterson (10-3, 2.90 ERA) and Tylor Megill (4-5, 4.04). Kodai Senga, the team's projected No. 1 starter this season, hopes to regain his All-Star form after pitching only 10 1/3 innings all year due to shoulder, calf and triceps injuries.

"This year has been a frustrating year," Senga said through a translator. "This offseason I'll have to look at a lot of things one by one, because post-rehab coming back, things just didn't click the same way that it did. That's a fact. In order to get my performance back up, I'll need to go over this offseason and re-examine things one by one."

Sean Manaea (12-6, 3.47 ERA), who blossomed into the staff ace during the second half of a breakout season, shed tears of pride in his close-knit Mets during a clubhouse interview following the season-ending

Edman was acquired at the trade deadline from the Cardinals and has been invaluable this postseason.

He's batting .341 and clubbed a two-run homer in the team's NLCS-clinching win over the Mets on Sunday. He won the NLCS MVP.

HOT TICKET

It'll take deep pockets to get to this year's Fall Classic — for the teams, and for fans.

The lowest asking ticket price on the resale market to any game has hovered in the \$1,200-\$1,300, range according to StubHub.

StubHub said Monday that sales outpaced last year's final figures and are four times higher than the pace of the 2022 Series. Sales for Games 3-5 in New York are 40% higher than for Games 1, 2, 6 and 7 in Los Angeles.

RULE CHANGES

Many of baseball's recent rule changes are still in effect during the postseason, including the pitch clock, a ban on extreme infield shifts and a limit to how many times a pitcher can disengage from the rubber. The pitch clock has been a huge change for the sport and widely celebrated, cutting game times by about a half-hour.

There is one rule that doesn't make the postseason cut: the so-called "ghost runner" in extra innings.

During the MLB regular season, if a game goes to extra innings, a runner is placed at second base to start the 10th inning when each team bats. That doesn't happen in the postseason. Extra innings will be played just like the previous nine.

BETTING FAVORITES

The Dodgers (-130) are the current betting favorites to win the World Series, according to BetMGM Sportsbook. The underdog Yankees are

at +110.

All seven games will be broadcast on Fox. They're also available on Hulu + Live TV, DirecTV and YouTube TV.

Still, the big left-hander seems likely to decline a \$13.5 million player option for 2025. That would make Manaea, Luis Severino (11-7, 3.91) and Jose Quintana (10-10, 3.75) all free agents. The veteran trio combined for 94 regular-season starts and 10 more in the playoffs.

"If I was an agent, I would be very happy. They made themselves a lot of money. As a teammate, it's going to be tough because they made themselves a lot of money and who knows where they'll end up?" Lindor said, referring specifically to Manaea and Alonso. "They're my brothers. I wish them nothing but the best, and hopefully they maximize everything they want."

Jose Buttó (7-3, 2.55 ERA, three saves), converted from a starter into a valuable reliever this season, could move back into the rotation.

Top pitching prospect Christian Scott is expected to miss 2025 following Tommy John surgery, and Brandon Sproat

is about the only highly touted arm in the upper levels of the farm system.

Stearns, however, has been especially adept at cobbling together quality pitching staffs, not only this season with the Mets but dating to his time running the small-budget Milwaukee Brewers.

Corbin Burnes, Max Fried and Blake Snell are top-of-the-rotation starters available on the free agent market.

"We already have a culture here. We set a precedent," Lindor said. "If you come here to this organization, you've got to work. You've got to work, you've got to respect everybody, and you're going to be held accountable for every action."

In the fourth season after Cohen bought the Mets from the Wilpon family, New York led the major leagues with a \$332 million payroll and is in line to pay a \$96 million luxury tax.

The blueprint since Cohen arrived has been the Dodgers, a perennial winner in a huge media market with a large payroll

but also a deep enough farm system to overcome significant injuries.

The resilient Mets looked those injury-depleted Dodgers in the eye during the NLCS and got blown out four times in six games, outscored 46-26 overall while setting a postseason record by issuing 42 walks in the series.

"That should be our goal — not only to be like them, but better than them," Mendoza said. "We've got work to do."

ACC race starts with No. 7 Duke and No. 9 UNC

The league needs more teams to join the chase

Jon Scheyer's third season at No. 7 Duke begins as the Atlantic Coast Conference favorite, even while adding 10 newcomers and preparing to lean on a freshman earning All-America recognition before ever playing a college game.

Ninth-ranked North Carolina has its typically lofty status and the nation's only returning first-team Associated Press All-American in RJ Davis.

Beyond that, the ACC needs someone — multiple someones, actually — to step up.

The ACC has spent months working to counter questions about its top-to-bottom quality amid lower-than-expected returns with bids to the NCAA Tournament and examining how to change that trajectory. Yet even as the league continues to outperform peers in March, it's the November-to-February part that needs bolstering as the ACC opens with only the Blue Devils and Tar Heels in the preseason AP Top 25.

"There is some pointing, about, 'Hey, take a look, our teams not only get into the tournament but more importantly they perform at the highest level that you can imagine,'" ACC Commissioner Jim Phillips told The Associated Press.


Yet the work to change that narrative starts in November as league teams take on nonconference matchups that will be the building blocks to Selection Sunday resumes.

That puts the burden on teams like Wake Forest, Clemson — which reached its first Elite Eight last year since the tournament's expansion to 64 teams in 1985 — Virginia, Miami or a Pittsburgh team that fell on the wrong side of last year's bubble. Or N.C. State, which last year made an improbable run to its first ACC Tournament title since 1987 and first Final Four since 1983.

And there are plenty of opportunities in the first six weeks for the league to help itself, starting at the

top with Duke (No. 1 Kansas, No. 10 Arizona and No. 11 Auburn) and UNC (Kansas and No. 2 Alabama).

The list goes on for teams picked in the top half of the league like Wake Forest (No. 13 Texas A&M), Clemson (Kentucky), Virginia (No. 12 Tennessee), Miami (No. 16 Arkansas) and N.C. State (Kansas, No. 14 Purdue and No. 19 Texas).

"Now it's just about playing the games and taking advantage of our opportunities, right?" second-year Notre Dame coach Micah Shrewsberry said. "Especially early in the year. You know, change the narrative of everybody by playing really well in November and December so people are talking about our league in a positive light before we get to conference play."

BUILDING COHESION

Attention at Duke will focus on star freshman Cooper Flagg, named to the

preseason AP All-America team and was being discussed as a potential No. 1 overall NBA draft pick before ever getting to campus.

For Scheyer, it's about more than Flagg's potential.

"The most talented teams haven't necessarily won the biggest. The most together teams have," Scheyer said. "That's why for us, this spring and summer, you need to have enough talent, no question. But the connectivity, the embracing of different roles and the blending of different talents is the most important thing."

SCORING CHASE?

Davis, last year's ACC player of the year, led the conference in scoring (21.2 points) and posted the program's fourth-highest points output (784). If he matched that in his fifth year of eligibility, he would tie program great Tyler Hansbrough for the ACC's ca-

reer scoring record (2,872).

"That's not my main focus," Davis told the AP.

ALL EYES ON CHARLOTTEVILLE

Virginia faces a major shakeup on the eve of the season with the sudden retirement of coach Tony Bennett, who was the ACC's only active coach with a national championship after recent retirements of Hall of Famers like North Carolina's Roy Williams (2021), Duke's Mike Krzyzewski (2022) and Syracuse's Jim Boheim (2023).

Assistant Ron Sanchez, who resigned as Charlotte's coach in June 2023 and returned to Bennett's staff, is the interim coach as the program tries to move forward.

TRAVEL WATCH

Stanford, Cal and SMU are the new additions to the league in its expan-

sion to a coast-to-coast footprint, which required changes to manage travel demands.

The league has set up a 2-for-1 scheduling approach: play two games for every one cross-country trip and essentially alternate weekends playing at home versus on the road, typically on Wednesdays and Saturdays before following with a home game.

NEW COACHES

There are three new coaches on the men's side beyond Sanchez's interim status.

Pat Kelsey left College of Charleston to try to end years of struggle at tradition-rich Louisville. Andy Enfield left USC to take over at SMU in time for its exit from the American Athletic Conference, and he'll see a familiar opponent with former Pac-12 peer Stanford under former Washington State coach Kyle Smith.

Purdue shooting for 3rd straight Big Ten title — in expanded conference

Purdue has won 63 of its last 74 games and two straight Big Ten championships, played in the national title game in April and has the conference's preseason player of the year among its three returning starters.

All that makes the 14th-ranked Boilermakers the favorite to win the league again.

Coach Matt Painter said whichever team finishes on top in the first season of an 18-team Big Ten will be the one that stays healthy, makes its own breaks and maybe gets a little lucky.

"It's just a crap shoot," he said. "It's good that people pick you to win your league, but it really means nothing. If you are there in the first week of March, then it does mean something."

Braden Smith is the preseason player of the year and joined by returning starters Fletcher Loyer and Trey Kaufman-Renn from the team that won a school-record 34 games. Four other players in the rotation also are back.

Seven of the 18 teams were in the NCAA Tournament last season — Purdue, Illinois, Nebraska, Northwestern, Wisconsin and Michigan State and conference newcomer Oregon.

How Oregon and the other West Coast teams fit in and how all 18 handle greater travel demands are unknowns that make it hard to predict a pecking order. Painter said navigating the season will be difficult. For his team, the first month includes games against No. 2 Alabama, No. 18 Marquette and possibly No. 24 Mississippi at a Thanksgiving event.

"And that's the one thing when you play a challenging schedule like we have in non-conference, that you have to get yourself prepared because it is such a bear when you get to Big Ten play," Painter said.

Besides Purdue, Big Ten teams in the preseason AP Top 25 are No. 17 Indiana, No. 22 UCLA and No. 15 Rutgers.

WHO'S BACK

G Braden Smith, Purdue, 6-0, 170, Jr: Big Ten preseason player

of the year averaged 12 points, 7.5 assists and 5.8 rebounds per game. He was the only player in NCAA history to have at least 450 points, 290 assists and 250 rebounds in a season.

F Payton Sandford, Iowa, 6-8, 215, Sr: Averaged 16.4 points, 6.6 rebounds and 2.7 assists. His 94 3-pointers led the Big Ten, and he was second in free-throw shooting (91.1%).

G Ace Baldwin Jr., Penn State, 6-1, 190, Gr: He was conference defensive player of the year with 2.67 steals per game, most by a Big Ten player since 1992-93. He averaged 14.2 points and 6 assists.

F Dawson Garcia, Minnesota, 6-11, 234, Sr: Averaged a team-best 17.6 points and 6.7 rebounds. He had 20-plus points 12 times, including three 30-point games.

G Bruce Thornton, Ohio State, 6-2, 215, Jr: Led Buckeyes with 15.7 points, 4.8 assists and 1.2 steals per game. His 4-to-1 assist-turnover ratio was second-best in the country.

TOP TRANSFERS

C Oumar Ballo, Indiana, 7-0, 265, Sr: The two-time All-Pac-12 first-team pick had 1,273 points, 867 rebounds, 109 assists, 76 steals, and 140 blocks in 132 career games with Arizona and Gonzaga. His teams were 112-20 in games in which he played.

Watkins, Bueckers headline preseason AP All-America team

USC star Juju Watkins and UConn's Paige Bueckers headline The Associated Press preseason All-America women's college basketball team released Tuesday that for the first time includes three sophomores in a clear sign of the young talent in a sport coming off a record year of fan interest.

Watkins and Bueckers were unanimous choices by the 30-member national media panel that selects the AP Top 25 each week. It's the third appearance on the team for Bueckers, who also was a preseason choice in her sophomore season and last year.

The duo was joined by Hannah Hidalgo of Notre Dame, Madison Booker of Texas and Kiki Iriafen of USC. Watkins, Hidalgo and Booker are all second-year players.

"It's unbelievable. Those players excelled as freshmen and their teams won. They did it in multiple ways," USC coach Lindsay Gottlieb said. "It's really exciting for the game and the future of it."

Gottlieb's stars, Watkins and Iriafen, are the first pair of teammates selected to the All-America team since 2017-18, when UConn had three of the five players chosen. Iriafen entered the transfer portal soon after Stanford Hall of Fame coach Tara VanDerwee announced her retirement in April.

"Kiki came because she wanted to play with Juju, who recruited her because she wanted to play with Kiki," Gottlieb said. "It's exciting to see their personalities mesh."

Watkins and her fellow sophomores were part of the ratings and attendance boom last season for women's college basketball that was led by Iowa's Caitlin Clark and LSU's Angel Reese. NCAA Tournament attendance was the highest it's ever been

and the championship game that featured Clark and Iowa against undefeated South Carolina had a record TV audience of 18.7 million, the highest for a basketball broadcast of any kind in five years.

Bueckers averaged 21.9 points and 5.2 rebounds to help UConn reach the Final Four,

where the Huskies lost to Iowa in another game that drew high viewership. UConn's star has eligibility left after sporadic injuries, but has said this will be her last year in school. She finally had a healthy season last year for the Huskies after missing most of her sophomore year.

Watkins burst onto the national scene as a freshman last year and put up eye-popping numbers. The Los Angeles native averaged 27.1 points, second only to Clark, and set the national record for a freshman with 920 points. She helped the Trojans reach the Elite Eight in their deepest NCAA Tournament run in three decades.

There are high expectations for the team, which is ranked third in the preseason poll behind No. 1 South Carolina and No. 2 UConn. Iriafen averaged 19.4 points and 11.0 rebounds for Stanford last year, including scoring a career-high 41 in the second round win over Iowa State in the NCAA Tournament.

Hidalgo, like Watkins, had a stellar freshman season. She averaged 22.6 points, 6.2 rebounds and 5.5 assists for the Fighting Irish, helping the team win the ACC Tournament and advance to the Sweet 16.

Booker stepped up her play for the Longhorns after Rori Harmon went down with an ACL injury in late December. She was thrust into the starting point guard slot and shined, averaging 16.5 points, 5.0 rebounds and 5.0 assists. Those numbers were even higher after Harmon's injury.

McManus, Barkley, Payton, Wilson, Chubb relish returns

Brandon McManus celebrated his game-winning field goal and his return to the NFL by doing — what else? — the Lambeau Leap.

Or maybe we should call it the “Lambeau Lift.”

“I definitely need to work on my hops,” said McManus, who needed help from fans pulling and teammates pushing to get into the stands and revel in the time-honored ritual started by Hall of Famer LeRoy Butler back in 1993 when McManus was but a toddler.

His lurch into the stands wasn't nearly as graceful as his 45-yard field goal as time expired that gave Green Bay a 24-22 victory over the Houston Texans, but it was among the highlights of the NFL's Week 7 that was dominated by joyous homecomings and rewarding returns.

Denver's defense and punishing ground game produced a 33-10 blowout of the Saints in New Orleans, where coach Sean Payton teamed with Drew Brees to give the Big Easy its only Super Bowl parade after the 2009 season.

Saquon Barkley had a happy homecoming at the Meadowlands, rushing for 176 yards and a touchdown in a 28-3 Eagles blowout of the Giants, who let him leave in free agency for Philadelphia in the offseason.

Russell Wilson, the quarterback Payton jettisoned in the offseason before the Broncos drafted Bo Nix, made his first start of the season after recovering from a strained calf and led the Pittsburgh Steelers to a 37-15 win over the New York Jets, validating coach Mike Tomlin's benching of Justin Fields after a 4-2 start.

The Kansas City Chiefs (6-0) emerged as the NFL's lone unbeaten team after turning their Super Bowl rematch with the San Francisco 49ers into more of a reproduction, handling the scuffling 49ers 28-18 eight months after beating them 25-22 for their second straight championship.

Cleveland running back Nick Chubb

returned from a gruesome knee injury early last season and ran for his first touchdown since Nov. 27, 2022, albeit in a game in which Browns quarterback Deshaun Watson ruptured his right Achilles tendon.

Some Browns fans cheered while the divisive QB was on the ground writing in pain after he collapsed as he began to run. It was the same sort of non-contact injury that took down Aaron Rodgers in the Jets' opener last year.

Rodgers' reunion with Davante Adams was a bust at least for their first game back together. The wide receiver, who played with Rodgers in Green Bay and forced his way out of Las Vegas to reunite with the four-time MVP, caught just three of nine passes thrown his way for 30 yards.

That was just one more pass than Steelers rookie cornerback Beanie Bishop caught from Rodgers. The Steelers turned his pair of interceptions into game-turning scores as they

closed on a 31-0 run after falling behind 15-6 early on.

Adams has the dubious distinction of having lost twice to the Steelers in back-to-back weeks and by a combined score of 69-28. He was inactive in the Raiders' 32-13 loss to Pittsburgh before the trade.

McManus joined the Packers midweek to replace struggling rookie kicker Brayden Narveson, who missed a league-high five field-goal tries.

McManus had been out of a job since

late spring, when two women sued him and the Jacksonville Jaguars in civil court alleging he sexually assaulted them when they were working as flight attendants on the Jaguars' trip to London. The NFL said late last month it didn't find sufficient evidence that McManus violated its personal conduct policy and the case was resolved, according to attorneys.

McManus keyed the Packers win when he made all three of his extra points and made the game-winner — twice — the first one didn't count because Texans coach DeMeco Ryans turned to another time-honored tradition and called a timeout at the last moment to try to ice the veteran kicker.

He should have known better.

“I always want a practice kick if I can,” McManus said. “It was a little windy. Just seeing where the wind might move the ball. So, if I for some reason miss the first one, I've never missed back-to-back kicks in my career, so I feel pretty confident. So, I always want to have that practice kick if I can.”

After he connected on the one that counted, McManus made a beeline to the end zone stands for his first Lambeau Leap.

“I was fortunate enough to play for Denver a long time, it's a good tradition franchise,” McManus said. “There's nothing better than this one. Green Bay's a special place. That's why I decided to do the Lambeau Leap just because of growing up watching Brett Favre play and I think it was Ryan Grant who started it? Oh, LeRoy Butler, yes. But I just remember watching players do the Lambeau Leap.”

McManus has a little work to do on his leap — it's a lot higher of a wall than it looks on TV — and his team history, but he and the Packers fanbase are grateful for the experience.

“What a tradition and a franchise this is and I figured it would be cool to do that,” McManus said.

Sung Kang found golf opportunity on 3 tours in 18 countries

Sung Kang didn't have the status to get in another full year on the PGA Tour, so he looked elsewhere. He found the Bahamas and Bahrain. He went as far south as Argentina, as far north as Denmark. He played at sea level and in the Alps.

He has learned plenty this year, such as this nugget for anyone curious.

“Singapore to Houston is really far,” Kang said early Tuesday in South Korea, the 18th country he has played in this year. He was dealing with jet lag from the 6,400-mile flight to Seoul from the Andalucia Masters along the southern coast of Spain.

Kang was referring to a trip in late March. He missed the cut in the Singapore Classic on the European tour and flew to Texas the next day so he could arrive in time for a Monday qualifier at the Houston Open. He shot 67 to get in and then missed the cut.

Next stop: Savannah, Georgia, for a Korn Ferry Tour event.

Such are the lengths — closing in on 100,000 miles in the air this year — the 37-year-old Kang was willing to travel from his home in Dallas just to keep playing, keep grinding, keep searching, all with hopes of finding his game and a path back to full status on the PGA

Tour.

It's a longer road than he imagined.


He is playing his 33rd tournament of the season last week in the Genesis Championship in his native South Korea, his 14th start on the European tour. He played 13 times on the Korn Ferry Tour and six times on the PGA Tour, either as a Monday qualifier or a past champion from having won the Byron Nelson in 2019.

That doesn't include qualifying for the U.S. Open, which led to one of the shorter commutes. Kang played a Korn Ferry Tour event in South Carolina the week before going to Pinehurst No. 2 in North Carolina.

“I've never done anything like this,” Kang said. “I've traveled more than I have in my life. I've been to South America, to the Middle East. When I was on the KPGA [Korea], it was more driving. When I came to the PGA Tour in 2011, it was mostly in the U.S. But nowhere close to this. My main goal is get the tour card back. I had no choice.”

It was almost a year ago to the day when the European tour provided such an option.

A strategic alliance allows for the leading 10 players from the European tour (not already exempt) to get PGA Tour cards. In return, the European tour last October offered membership to anyone on the PGA

Tour who finished between No. 126 and No. 200 in the FedEx Cup.

Kang, who played 10 full seasons on the PGA Tour, had his worst year. He finished at No. 193.

The caveat was no more than five players from this new category could play any given week on the European tour if there was room for them. There weren't many takers.

Jonas Blixt of Sweden, who finished at No. 197, took the offer and has played exclusively on the European tour. The Genesis Championship in South Korea will be his 23rd start on the Old World circuit this year. Dylan Frittelli (No. 160) was another. He won in Bahrain in early February and has stayed mainly on the European tour ever since.

For all the travel, Kang's

game is not anywhere close to where he wants it. He missed the cut in all but one of his Korn Ferry Tour starts. His only cut on the PGA Tour was at the Byron Nelson. He made only five cuts on the European tour — Qatar, Prague, Denmark, Madrid and the Dunhill Links Championship in Scotland.

He felt his short game carried him when he struggled with his iron game. Once he finally started hitting it better, he felt he was out of practice on so many 15- to 20-foot putts. All the while, he had trouble patching together a series of good scores.

“This year has been so weird,” Kang said, making a statement that can cover a lot of territory.

He has no regrets about the decision. Kang said the Korn Ferry Tour represents a shift in the game from when he played that developmental circuit a decade ago. The players are younger, longer, more athletic. The scoring typically was so low he felt he should try his hand in Europe.

Neither has gone well, except for the scenery.

Kang had never been to Europe outside the U.K. His favorite city was Prague. The most beautiful scenery was a train from Zurich to Crans Montana in Switzerland. The biggest surprise? A week of gorgeous weather in Scotland during the Dunhill.

The worst of it was time away, especially with three children — a 6-year-old, a 2 1/2-year-old and the youngest born five months ago.

“I'm missing them growing up,” Kang said.

Perhaps that's one silver lining of poor results. He goes home whenever he misses the cut and he's within 1,000 miles or so of Dallas.

All that, and his future remains just as uncertain.

He won't have that European option next year from having accrued only minimal FedEx Cup points from the one cut he made on the PGA Tour.

“I have to find a place to play next year,” Kang said. “There's no guarantee how many I'll get in on the PGA Tour. I need some sort of backup. Hopefully, I won't travel as much.”

The travel has been tiring, but he says his energy level is fine on the golf course. For now, he's not done trying. He has the Genesis Championship this week, and his plan is another Monday qualifier on the PGA Tour in two weeks in Mexico.

After a year like this, December probably can't get here soon enough.

Or maybe not.

“Q-school is the first week of December,” he said.

Nelly Korda has all but wrapped up LPGA player of the year

The case for LPGA Tour player of the year could be compelling if it were decided by a vote of the players instead of a points system.

As it stands, Nelly Korda has virtually locked up the award for the first time. Lydia Ko would have to win four more tournaments the rest of the season, and she is playing in only two of them. Two other players, Ayaka Furue and Haeran Ryu, would have to win out.

Korda winning would not elicit much of a debate. Her six victories this year include a major at The Chevron Championship, and she tied an LPGA record by winning five in a row that brought much-needed attention to the LPGA.

Ko has won four times this year, including the Women's British Open at St. Andrews. The

LPGA remarkably counts only three wins toward the points-based award. Left out is that shiny gold medal at the Olympics.

How would the players vote?

The benefit of using points is eliminating subjectivity. The PGA Tour uses a player vote, and it was surprising last year when Scottie Scheffler with his two wins captured the award over Jon Rahm, whose four wins included the Masters.

Scheffler's consistency — the best statistical season since peak Tiger Woods — was a big factor. Unknown was whether Rahm lost votes by defecting to LIV Golf in the middle of the voting.

Ko might be the first to agree Korda is deserving of the award. It's also likely the Kiwi wouldn't trade her season. Golf is about trophies, and it's also

about moments. Ko has some big ones.

Her gold medal in Paris, which followed a bronze in Tokyo and a silver in Rio de Janeiro, made her eligible for the LPGA Hall of Fame. Winning another major was big, but winning at St. Andrews is next level.

The Golf Writers Association of America will decide at year's end through a vote.

The PGA Tour, meanwhile, might have a similar argument. Scheffler is the likely choice for another stunning statistical year, this time to go along with seven victories, including the Masters and The Players Championship, and four signature events.

He also won the Olympic gold medal with a 62 in the final round.

Xander Schauffele won only

twice, but they were majors at the PGA Championship and British Open. And players tend to put the most weight on majors.

No PGA Tour member has ever won two majors in the same year without being voted player of the year (Nick Faldo was not a member in 1990). Then again, it could be a measure of whether players really put The Players on par with a major.

Voting for PGA Tour player of the year doesn't start until after the season ends on Nov. 24.

This would seem to be an easy choice — at least Schauffele thinks so. He was asked Tuesday in Japan what it would take to win the award next year.

“It seems I need to have the best career ever,” he said. “I just had my best career ever and wasn't really close.”

A SHORT RETURN

Justin Thomas is ending one of the longest breaks of his career when he plays the Zozo Championship. He last competed on Sept. 1 at the Tour Championship. And then it's time for another break as his wife is due to give birth to their first child next month.

“I was champing at the bit to get here,” Thomas said Tuesday. “The time off is nice, but if I don't compete for a long time, I want to get back and play in tournaments again.”

He said he has a mix of time spent with family and friends and plenty of practice.

“I've been excited to practice and been really excited for the opportunity to play and compete this week,” he said. “Although it's been an enjoyable time off, I'm very happy to be back and play in a tournament again.”

He said impending fatherhood probably won't hit him until the flight home to Florida.

BAHAMAS FIELD

Tiger Woods released the field for his Hero World Challenge in the Bahamas the first week of December. His name is not yet on the list.

Woods had another back surgery last month, and the recovery time is eight to 12 weeks. The hope is he can return for the PNC Championship with his son on Dec. 21-22, and his camp had not ruled out him playing in the Bahamas.

Scottie Scheffler is back to defend his title on Dec. 5-8. Also committed to playing were Ludvig Aberg (coming off knee surgery) and Patrick Cantlay. Newcomers include Robert MacIntyre, Matthieu Pavon and Aaron Rai.

South chose to open his hand one spade rather than one no trump and ended up in a reasonable four-spade contract. Things got a little ugly when West led the ace of hearts and East discarded a diamond. West

continued with the jack of hearts for East to ruff, and East shifted to the jack of diamonds.

South judged that the diamond finesse would be too dangerous, so he rose with his ace. Should the outstanding trumps be splitting 2-2, South could just draw trumps and make his contract. If they were 3-1, South would need a 3-2 club split. Good chance for that, reasoned South, as West would likely have led a singleton club rather than the ace of hearts. This would be true provided that West was not also short in spades. South combined his chances by cashing just the ace of spades, then cashing the ace of clubs and leading a low club. When West discarded a heart, South won with dummy's king, cashed the queen of clubs, and ruffed a club. A spade to dummy's king allowed South to discard a diamond on the established club as East ruffed with his last spade. Making four!






